

FEATURE | CAPTIVE REVIEW HALL OF FAME

he Captive Review Hall of Fame was launched six years ago, a list designed to recognise the most influential figures in the captive insurance industry. The first iteration of the Hall of Fame featured 13 inductees, all professionals from across the captive industry who had made a significant impact during their time with captive insurance.

Since then, the list has grown, adding more leading captive figures to its ranks. This year, we induct three more captive professionals - Alan Gier from GM Motors, Mary-Ellen Moriarty from EIIA, and Bruce Whitmore from Willis Towers Watson.





ALAN GIER

Gier had his first job with GM Motors when he was at university, working in a local plant in his summer break. He later returned to the company, working in management positions across various areas of the business. In 2000 he

moved into the risk management and insurance sphere. where he has had great influence over the last 22 years. President and chairman of General International Limited, GM's Captive Insurance Company domiciled in Bermuda and Washington DC. Gier was also president of the Bermuda Captive Owners association for two years.



MARY-ELLEN MORIARTY

With over 30 years' experience, Moriarty has seen all the ups and downs of the insurance industry over the last three decades. Spending the first 10 years of her career working for national insurance brokers and com-

mercial insurance carriers, she moved to EIIA in 2002. She is still actively engaged in the captive industry, often speaking at events and putting her hand up to contribute. She sits on the board of CICA and is a member of its Amplify Women group.



BRUCE WHITMORE

Whitmore has been working in the risk financing industry for 30 years, across a number of organisations before starting his own captive management firm and insurance brokerage in 1999. He joined Willis Towers Watson in 2013

and since then has been involved in the formation and management of countless captives, including pure captives, group captives and risk retention groups.



STEVE BUTTERWORTH

Guernsey's first dedicated insurance regulator, Butterworth was the driving force behind the introduction of the formalised rent-a-captive - the protected cell company. Already experienced in insurance and captive requlation from time spent in the Cayman Islands, he moved to Guernsey in 1986 and on 1 February 11 years later, the Protected Cell Companies Ordinance, 1997 went live. There are now thousands of individual cells and cell companies operating around the world, in domiciles from Hawaii to the Cayman Islands, providing a lower-cost, more informal option to prospective captive owners.



JOFI CHANSKY

Boston-based Chansky is well known throughout the captive insurance world for his actuarial knowledge. Having started his career at American Agricultural Insurance Company, Chansky has since enjoyed nearly 32 years at Miliman, where he works as a consulting actuary. With bundles of expertise in the formation and ongoing actuarial needs of captives, Chansky has quickly become a leading light for fellow professionals. As board chair of CICA, faculty member of ICCIE and a former board member of the NRRA, AZCIA and the Captive Insurance Council of the District of Columbia, Chansky's positive impact and hard work for the sector has not gone unnoticed.



ELLEN CHARNLEY

Charnley is a name everyone in the global captive industry knows. Head of Marsh Captive Solutions, far and away the largest captive manager in the market, she strategically runs the large operation that overseas 44 domiciles and leads a team of 450 staff. A figure in the industry for decades, Charnley started her captive career in Bermuda working for a rent-a-captive operation, before becoming vice-president of captive management firm Charles Taylor. In 2004, she joined Marsh and has been considered a significant voice in the organisation ever since.



MICHAEL CORBETT

Corbett has long been a vocal advocate of the captive industry, and particularly of Tennessee as a domicile. One of the founding members of the Tennessee Captive Insurance Association. Corbett currently serves on its board of directors. He joined the Tennessee Department of Captive Insurance in 2011 and shaped the domicile, leading to large growth for Tennessee's captive insurance industry. After working for the Tennessee regulator for eight years. Corbett moved to Pinnacle Financial Partners, where he is continuing to contribute to the captive industry.



LEONARD D CROUSE

Crouse is synonymous with the State of Vermont and its crucial growth period through the 1990s and beyond. Arriving in Vermont from Massachusetts in 1990, Crouse began work in the Green Mountain State as director of captive insurance before being made deputy commissioner of captive Insurance in 2003.
